EDITORIAL

At the New York Diamond League meeting on Saturday all eyes were on the return of world record holder David Rudisha, who suffered a muscle spasm in Ostrava two weeks ago. The Kenyan Olympic champion did not disappoint, remaing unbeaten in four straight New York Adidas Grand Prix events. He won, with some effort, in 1:43.58, a mere 0.2 sec slower than Mohammed Aman's world leader (which was Rudisha's target). Behind him Boris Berian (USA) jumped to the top of the US 800-metre standings with his surprising 1:43.84, smashing his previous PB of 1:45.30.

In the same event for women, an increasingly confident Ajee' Wilson (USA) easily took the measure of Janeth Jepkosgei (KEN) with a win in 1:58.83.

There was one world record at the meeting – by 11-year-old Jonah Gorevic in the mile (see Background later in this issue).

At the NCAA Championships in Eugene Dominique Scott was – somewhat surprisingly – beaten in both the 5000 m and the 10000 m, running 15:40.47 (behind Emily Sisson's 15:34.10) and 33:25.81 (behind Molly Seidel's 33:18.37).

Locally, Lusapho April showed good form in the City of Champions Youth Challenge 10 km in Port Elizabeth this weekend, winning by more than half a minute in 29:57. The women's race went to frequent racer Ntombesintu Mfunzi in 36:51 – by almost three minutes!

In the Mamre 15 km master Eric Coetzee set a superb new list leader or 52:28; he now joins Margie Saunders as the only athletes who have four list leaders in their respective age categories. They also share something else: both are DRR subscribers.

DRR has been informed that the athlete in 14th position in the Spar Grand Prix race in Durban last weekend (results in DRR 15:22) was not Angeline Saidi, but in actual fact Bulelwa Simae. The time, 36:09, was correct.

Last week it was pointed out that Cape Town grandmaster Nancy Will had run both the 8 km and 15 km events at the Don Lock Memorial that weekend – just seven days after completing the Comrades Marathon. Unsurprisingly, it turns out that she had also raced two cross-country events the day before. This means that in eight days Will had covered a jaw-dropping 124.7 km in races, or an average of 15.6 km per day!

DOPING ALLEGATIONS DENIED BY SALAZAR AND RUPP

A British television investigation, broadcast by the BBC on 3 June, has rocked the sport of athletics, leading the BBC News that night and creating newspaper headlines worldwide, reports *Athletics Interntional*. The Panorama programme, entitled "Catch Me If You Can", implied that celebrated coach and former marathon star Alberto Salazar had violated antidoping rules, including involvement in the doping of Galen Rupp, runner-up to Mo Farah in the 2012 Olympic 10000 m.

A document was screened indicating that Rupp was being prescribed testosterone, which is on the banned list, from the age of 16. It was alleged also that Rupp regularly took prednisone, a drug for treating asthma which is banned unless a TUE (Therapeutic Use Exemption) form is issued by a doctor to allow an athlete to use such a drug to treat a legitimate medical condition.

Referring to the testosterone medication listed on Rupp's document, Salazar explained that it should have read testoboot, a legal nutritional supplement. Both Salazar and Rupp strenuously deny any involvement in doping, but at least seven people associated with the Nike Oregon Project, Salazar's state-of-the-art training camp in Portland, have communicated their concerns to the US Anti-Doping Agency (USADA). They include 2007 World Champs 10000 m bronze medallist Kara Goucher, who trained there for seven years until 2011 and had regarded Salazar as a father figure.

She described him as "a sort of win-at-all-costs person, and it's hurting the sport." She said that in 2011, after the birth of her son, Salazar had encouraged her to take the thyroid drug cytomel in order to lose weight even though he knew it was not prescribed for her.

Although Farah has trained with Rupp under Salazar's supervision for the past four years, there is no suggestion that he has ever been involved in doping. He stated: "I have not taken any banned substances and Alberto has never suggested that I take a banned substance. From my experience, Alberto and the Oregon Project have always followed WADA rules." Nevertheless, several leading British runners have advised him to move away from Salazar and his training environment.

Jo Pavey, another star British athlete, said: "As an athlete you don't want to associate yourself with people that have got accusations and allegations against them." Pavey's countryman Andy Vernon said: "It's not good for his reputation, that's for sure. If Salazar was giving him [Rupp] that [testosterone] when he was 16, you have to question whether he should be allowed to coach athletes in future." And Jenny Meadows said Farah would be judged by some as "guilty by association" if he remained at the Nike Oregon Project.

Salazar commented: "I believe in a clean sport and a methodical, dedicated approach to training and have never, nor ever will, endorse the use of banned substances with any of my athletes." Rupp stated he was very disappointed in the BBC and Pro Publica [a website with the slogan "journalism in the public interest"]. "I expressly told these reporters that these allegations were not true and their sources admit they have no evidence, yet they print 'suspicions' attacking me and sullying my reputation. That is inexcusable, irresponsible iournalism."

Nike issued this statement: "We take the allegations very seriously as Nike does not condone the use of performance enhancing drugs in any manner. Both Alberto and Galen have made their perspectives clear and fully refute the allegations made against them."

Nike may not condone doping but the company recently arranged a lucrative sponsorship deal with the proven but unrepentant drugs cheat, Justin Gatlin.

The World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) stated: "We have carefully viewed the BBC's Panorama programme which includes some allegations suggesting doping in athletics. Among these, the programme alleges practises relating to coach Alberto Salazar of the Nike Oregon Project in the United States. Any investigation will be a matter for USADA and the IAAF, and the relevant information shall be passed to them."

UK Athletics has to determine whether to continue Salazar's contract as a consultant to its endurance programme, a role he has fulfilled since December 2013. A press release on 6 June stated: "Whilst acknowledging the gravity of the allegations, UK Athletics can confirm it has had absolutely no concerns over the conduct and coaching methods of Alberto Salazar in relation to Mo Farah or in his role as an endurance consultant. As an organisation with a proven anti-doping commitment, we view the allegations made in regard of non-British athletes who have been coached by Alberto Salazar with utmost seriousness. It is the role of the appropriate independent anti-doping agencies to investigate these further."

At a press conference the day before the Sainsbury's Birmingham Grand Prix, Farah said he had phoned Salazar the previous night and had been told by him that these were just allegations. Farah told reporters: "I'm not leaving Alberto, for the reason I've not seen any clear evidence," but, referring to the allegations, he added: "If they turn out to be true, and Alberto has crossed the line, I'm the first person to leave him."

Early on Sunday morning Farah left Birmingham to fly back to Oregon. A statement issued on his behalf by UKA read: "This week has been very stressful and taken a lot out

of me. I have not been able to focus properly on today's race and after the events of the last few days feel emotionally and physically drained. I want to run well in the IAAF World Athletics Championships in Beijing and have decided it is better for me to go back to the US, seek answers to my questions and get back into training. I apologise to the people who bought tickets to come and watch me race and ask for your understanding at this time."

On 8 June, UKA Chairman Ed Warner told the BBC Radio 4 programme "Today" that Farah's own medical data would be assessed as part of UKA's investigation. "What we can look at is all the data surrounding our own athlete, Mo Farah; blood data, supplements data – everything surrounding his medical treatment. We're in charge of that. We need to make sure there's nothing else there we haven't seen, we're not aware of, hasn't been analysed."

The Panorama programme also alleged that Allan Wells took the banned anabolic steroid stanozolol before winning the 1980 Olympic 100 m title in Moscow, a claim made (not for the first time) by his Scottish relay team-mate Drew McMaster, who in 1995 admitted he himself had taken performance enhancing drugs. Wells told the *Daily Mail* he was the victim of a personal vendetta. "It is a set-up. There is absolutely no truth and it is made up. These allegations go back more than 20 years and have resurfaced at regular intervals. I could never have taken drugs. I just could not have lived with myself. Once again I find myself having to publicly deny these false and malicious rumours about doping."

CROSS-COUNTRY DISTANCES NOW 10 KM

Both senior men and women will in future run 10 km at the World Cross-country Championships. This was one of the rule changes approved at the recent IAAF Council meeting.

The distances "should be approximately" 10 km, the IAAF said in a statement. Distances for the junior men and women will remain at 8 km and 6 km repectively. In the past the distances for the seniors were 12 km and 8 km respectively.

While the world body said dthe rule change will take effect on 1 November, the Athletics South Africa (ASA) Cross-country Commission has decided that it should be implemented with immediate effect. Thus it will apply at the SA Championships on 12 September, and provinces have been requested to implement the new rule at their league meetings and provincial championships, said Pieter de Jager, Technical Manager of ASA.

BACKGROUND

JONAH GOREVIC STARS WITH BOLT, RUDISHA AT ICAHN STADIUM

Amidst all of the close races and heated competition at Saturday's adidas Grand Prix, a world record somehow got lost in the shuffle, reports Race Results Weekly. Very early in the meeting, before any IAAF Diamond League races had been held on Icahn Stadium's blue oval, 11-year-old Jonah Gorevic recorded a world single-age record in the mile, winning the Boys' Youth Mile in 4:51.85.

Gorevic has been a force on

the youth scene, winning multiple national titles both indoors and out. Last April, he took home national crowns in the 1500 m and 3000 m, and finished second in the 800 m. A native of Rye, N.Y., Gorevic led wire to wire on Saturday, bringing the crowd to their feet as he shattered the previous world best of 4:55.

Across the line, Gorevic celebrated with a smile and proudly held the winner's bouquet of flowers. A year ago, Gorevic had run 5:01.55 to set a world record for 10-year-olds at the meet. With another year's experience, the sixth grader was confident he could set another personal best and take home the win on his favorite track.

Gorevic spent time speaking with members of the media following his victory, a smile never leaving his face. To learn more about the young star, *Race Results Weekly* has highlighted some fast facts about the newly minted world record holder.

30 years ago: 1 June 1985

Francie Larrieu (USA) became one of the few women who could boast a road victory over the formidable Grete Waitz when she beat the Norwegian superstar in the L'eggs Mini 10 km in New York. Larrieu won in 32:23 after Waitz had scored five victories in the premier women's race in the USA. This time Waitz, also a five-time world cross-country champion, ran 32:26; her fastest victory was in 1982, when she clocked 31:00. Aurora Cunha (POR) was third and Anne Audain (NZL), the 1983 winner, fourth. Olympic

marathon champion Joan Benoit was eleventh. The race was run for the 44th time this past weekend.
